CHARLIE'S CHATTER

Welcome to the 1981-82 Ski Season. It's that time, regardless of the 80° days that some of us still have down in the flat lands. The fall First Aid Refreshers are on the calendar with the Section Chiefs and Instructors putting all the paper work together to have the finest refreshers yet. CPR will not be covered in the refreshers this year. IT WILL BE EACH PATROLLER'S RESPONSIBILITY TO GET THEIR OWN CPR CARD UP-DATED. Your First Aid Pack (Fanny Pack) usually needs some refreshing also. Check to see if your pack has all the supplies needed for the first snow fall.

An item of concern that came out at the National Meeting is "Patch-Covered" parkas. We need to get all of the patches that are not NSPS removed from our parkas. Each of us needs to take a look at ourselves in a mirror to see how we look to the skiing public and to our ski area managers. These are the people who literally control the future existence of NSPS. The "Patch Control" is going to be another unpleasant job that falls to the PL. The cleaning up of the parkas will not be a difficult job if we all get our own parka to the standards set in the Ski Patroller's Manual.

We now have two ski areas in Kentucky. General Butler Ski Area in General Butler State Park is slated to be open this ski season. At the present time it is not known as to whether the NSPS will have a patrol there. Robert Bodamer, WV/KY SC will try to work out the details of having a volunteer NSPS patrol.

I would like to solicit the help of all patrollers, PLs, SCs and RDs to implement Region and Section people to assist Division Advisors in the following: Auxiliary, Avalanche, Awards, Equipment, First Aid, Fund Raising, Historian, Junior, Lift Evacuation, Mountaineering, Nordic and T & T. We need to fill all these positions to have better communication from Advisors to Patrollers. Hopefully this will get better participation from the patrollers for many of the programs that are greatly needed. Also, it should make more of the programs available to the patrollers when the Division Advisor can not be at all places at all times. Most of the positions are in the field of training patrollers and are the life blood of the system. This is going to take some coordination between the RDs and Advisors and will give the region people a better opportunity to work closer with the patrols instead of the advisors trying to make themselves available over the entire division.

I hope to see all of you this season, either at the refreshers or on the hill at your area. We are looking forward to the best ski season ever! Our division may be small in numbers, but is very large in heart and has great patrollers.

Thanks to Sherry Perry and all those good folks at Sugar Mountain Resort for hosting the meeting, the luncheon and the "Sherry Perry Special." Thanks also to Murray Reed and all the other fine people of Westridge at Sugar for the afternoon "Social" and the tour of the condominium.

NEWS RELEASE

Individual Ski Patrols are always thinking of methods to raise funds for their treasury. This music festival idea of the Mt. Watatic Ski Patrol is one excellent idea.

A two-day music festival at Mt. Watatic attended by more than 10,000 people provided the Mt. Watatic Ski Patrol an opportunity for an extended summer practice and netted the Patrol treasury \$1,000.00 the weekend of July 11-12.

George Blotcher, who will begin his third season as patrol leader at the mountain this winter, said that the thirty members who volunteered for the weekend duty "performed with the same proficiency they do all winter long."

Despite the lack of snow, patrol members swept the hill after hours, checked for ticket holders and administered first aid, as they do in the winter.

"The majority of injuries was cut and bruised feet, stubbed toes and bug bites," Blotcher said. "There was only one medical emergency which we felt was from a preexisting condition."

"Things went so smoothly for the Town of Ashby, the mountain and the Ski Patrol," he continued, "the mountain's management is now considering having more concerts."

Upon learning that the concert's promoters, Music in the Air, were planning on holding the festival that featured performer, Arlo Guthrie, as well as arts and crafts exhibits, Blotcher contacted them. He suggested that Ski Patrol volunteers be used to supplement the town's police. His offer was readily accepted.

Blotcher had praise not only for the general conduct of the patrol but also for Assistant Patrol Leader, Jerry Brown, who, he said "did a yeoman's job and functioned as an intermediary between the promoter and the ski patrol."

The money earned will be used "for the general good of the patrol," said Blotcher.

Blotcher has been a ski patrol member at the mountain for eleven seasons. He is a senior and holder of Circle A and Circle M awards as well as a first aid instructor.

If you know of other unique methods, please forward such ideas to the National Office and we will see that distribution is made so others might benefit from it also.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA
SESSION 1981
RATIFIED BILL

CHAPTER 939
SENATE BILL 502

AN ACT SETTING FORTH DUTIES OF SKIERS AND SKI AREA OPERATORS AND LIMITATIONS THEREOF.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. The General Statutes of North Carolina are hereby amended by adding a new chapter thereto to read as follows:

"CHAPTER 99C

"Actions Relating to Skier Safety and Skiing Accidents.

"§ 99C-1. *Definitions* — When used in this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

(1) 'Skier' means any person who is wearing skis or any person who for the purpose of skiing is on a designated and clearly marked ski slope or ski trail that is located at a ski area, or any person who is a passenger or spectator at a ski area.

(2) 'Passenger' means any person who is being transported or is awaiting transportation, or being conveyed on a passenger tramway or is moving from the disembarkation point of a passenger tramway or is in the act of embarking upon or disembarking from a passenger tramway.

(3) 'Passenger Tramway' shall mean any device used to transport passengers uphill on skis, or in cars on tracks, or suspended in the air, by the use of steel cables, chains, belts or ropes. Such definition shall include such devices as a chair lift, J Bar, or platter pull, rope tow, and wire tow.

(4) 'Ski Area' means all the ski slopes, ski trails, and passenger tramways, that are administered or operated as a ski area enterprise within this State.

(5) 'Ski Area Operator' means a person, corporation, or organization that is responsible for the safe operation and maintenance of the ski area.

(6) 'Competitor' means a skier actually engaged in competition or in practice therefor with the permission of the ski area operator on any slope or trail or portion thereof designated by the ski area operator for the purpose of competition.

"§ 99C-2. *Duties of ski operators and skiers* — (1) A ski area operator shall be responsible for the maintenance and safe operation of any passenger tramway in his ski area and insure that such is in conformity with the rules and regulations prescribed and adopted by the North Carolina Department of Labor pursuant to G.S. 95-120 (1) as such appear in the North Carolina Administrative Procedures Act. The North Carolina Department of Labor shall conduct certifications and inspections of passenger tramways.

A ski area operator's responsibility regarding passenger tramways shall include, but is not limited to, insuring operating personnel are adequately trained and are adequate in number; meeting all standards set forth for terminals, stations, line structures, and line equipment; meeting all rules and regulations regarding the safe operation and maintenance of all passenger lifts and tramways, including all necessary inspections and record keeping.

(2) A skier and/or a passenger shall have the following responsibilities:

- (a) To know the range of his own abilities to negotiate any ski slope or trail and to ski within the limits of such ability;
- (b) To maintain control of his speed and course at all times when skiing and to maintain a proper lookout so as to be able to avoid other skiers and visible objects;
- (c) To stay clear of snow grooming equipment, all vehicles, lift towers, signs, and any other equipment of the ski slopes and trails;
- (d) To heed all posted information and other warnings and to refrain from acting in a manner which may cause or contribute to the injury of the skier or others;
- (e) To wear retention straps, ski brakes, or other devices to prevent runaway skis;
- (f) Before beginning to ski from a stationary position or before entering a ski slope or trail from the side, to avoid moving skiers already on the ski slope or trail;

- (g) To not move uphill on any passenger tramway or use any ski slope or trail while such person's ability to do so is impaired by the consumption of alcohol or by the use of any narcotic or other drug or while such person is under the influence of alcohol or any narcotic or any drug;
 - (h) If involved in a collision with another skier or person, to not leave the vicinity of the collision before giving his name and current address to an employee of the ski area operator, a member of the ski patrol, or the other skier or person with whom the skier collided, except in those cases when medical treatment is required; in which case, said information shall be provided as soon as practical after the medical treatment has been obtained. If the other person involved in the collision is unknown, the skier shall leave the personal identification required by this subsection with the ski area operator;
 - (i) Not to embark upon or disembark from a passenger tramway except at an area that is designated for such purpose;
 - (j) Not to throw or expel any object from a passenger tramway;
 - (k) Not to perform any action that interferes with the operation or running of a passenger tramway;
 - (l) Not to use such tramway unless he has the ability to use it with reasonable safety;
 - (m) Not to engage willfully or negligently in any type conduct that contributes to or causes injury to another person or his properties;
 - (n) Not to embark upon a passenger tramway without the authority of the ski area operator.
- (3) A ski area operator shall have the following responsibilities:
- (a) To mark all trails and maintenance vehicles and to furnish such vehicles with flashing or rotating lights that shall be in operation whenever the vehicles are working or moving in the ski area;
 - (b) To mark with a visible sign or other warning implement the location of any hydrant or similar equipment that is used in snowmaking operations and located anywhere in the ski area;
 - (c) To indicate the relative degree of difficulty of a slope or trail by appropriate signs. Such signs are to be prominently displayed at the base of a slope where skiers embark on a passenger tramway serving the slope or trail, or at the top of a slope or trail. The signs must be of the type that have been approved by the National Ski Areas Association and are in current use by the industry;
 - (d) To post at or near the top of or entrance to any designated slope or trail, signs giving reasonable notice of unusual conditions on the slope or trail;
 - (e) To provide adequate ski patrols;
 - (f) To mark clearly any hidden rock, hidden stump, or any other hidden hazard known by the ski area operator to exist;
 - (g) Not to engage willfully or negligently in any type conduct that contributes to or causes injury to another person or his properties.

“§ 99C-3. *Negligence, Civil actions* — A violation of any responsibility placed on the skier, passenger or ski area operator as set forth in G. S. 99C-2, to the extent such violation proximately causes injury to any person or damage to any property, shall constitute negligence on the part of the person violating the provisions of the section.

“§ 99C-4. *Competition* — The ski area operator shall, prior to the beginning of a competition, allow each competitor a reasonable visual inspection of the course or area where the competition is to be held. The competitor shall be held to assume risk of all course conditions including, but not limited to, weather and snow conditions, course construction or layout, and obstacles which a visual inspection should have revealed. No liability shall attach to a ski area operator for injury or death or any competitor proximately caused by such assumed risk.

“§ 99C-5. *Exception* — The operation of a passenger tramway shall not constitute the operation of a common carrier.”

Section 3. This action shall become effective October 1, 1981.

In the General Assembly read three times and ratified, this the 10th day of July, 1981.

Seven Devils — Up & Coming

Again with new management this year, Seven Devils is looking better than ever for the upcoming ski season. Management has already begun widening most of the slopes plus grading down the large bumps and plateaus for a smoother run. The snow-making capacity has been increased by 50%. With the snow guns which were purchased last year, all we need now is cold weather. We are spending approximately \$50,000 to improve the lodge, which is long overdue. A permanent maze will be set up to ease the lift line problem and lessen the crowded slopes. Both chair lifts have been completely overhauled to insure safety and efficiency.

The ski patrol will have three pro patrollers this year. Chuck Surber returns from last year and will be pro PL. Rick (Wreck) Dixon and Wes Benbow will be working with him. Anyone who is not a senior will be allowed to sign on in an auxiliary status until their skiing and toboggan handling skills can be observed.

I will be working as Assistant Manager in charge of making snow, grooming, lift operations and other outside operations.
