All regions were represented by well qualified and eager young people. As you know, the Southern division has always been solidly behind the Junior Program and seeing such fine examples of the program here was great. It is unfortunate that all cannot come out the winner, but all of these participants are winners in my book. The First Aid Written and Practical tests were held on Saturday, and were capped off with a wonderful spaghetti supper at Dottie Spencer's. Sunday, the skiing and toboggan tests were held. Congratulations to all of these great juniors! Have a wonderful time at Lake Placid at the National Junior Seminar. I know you will represent the Southern Division well.

On to some of the things at the Mid Winter Meeting that should be of interest to you. The final plans for the Golden Anniversary Meeting in Boston are not in, but we were told the Spouse Tour would be outstanding. The last six of our National Chairmen will be in attendance. We hope the six or more of our National Patrollers who have 50 years of service will be there. It should be a wonderful meeting, with a bonus available of seeing the birthplace of a lot of our country's history.

We have a new ski supplier, NISHIZAWA. They are the second oldest ski company in the world, in business since 1925. They pride themselves on making high quality skis. We saw some and they look great. Their skis are made with a combination of laminated woods as beech, ash and hickory. They will offer super buys to patrollers, and we will hope to have a Nishizawa rep at our Fall Officers Meeting.

The new Certified Manual and the new Avalanche Manual are finished and are in stock in the National Office if you want one. The Awards Manual and the Patrol Leaders Manual are available too.

John Clair reported on the WEC meeting held in Denver a week prior to our meeting. We are maintaining a working relationship with the ARC on bridge courses. The WEC Instruction Manual will be available April 1, 1988. The WEC Text, which will be called *The Outdoor Emergency Care Manual*, will be available for distribution September 1, 1988. There will be a student workbook available at that time too. Ski Patrols in Finland, Japan and Sweden are interested in using our WEC Program.

The most controversial topic brought up was the Junior Program. This one topic took up a full half day of the total time. The Committee had been charged with developing a "total" Junior Program with the National Seminar just a part of the whole. For many and varied reasons, which I will discuss with any of you that are interested, the Board voted to discontinue the National Junior Seminar after this year at Lake Placid. This doesn't mean we won't have a National Junior Seminar again, but rather that it will have to be recommended by the Junior Committee to be a part of the total Junior Program and passed by the Board.

The NSP is in good shape financially. I believe all of you who have ordered parkas this year have received them in a timely fashion. Steve Over and the office staff are doing a great job for us and deserve your thanks when you have the opportunity to let them know.

Remember the Spring Convention in Gatlinburg on April 30, 1988. There is information on it in this same issue of the Southern Cross. Get your reservations in quickly so the committee can firm up their plans. A REMINDER—Written reports will be due from Line Officers and Advisors in early April. Doug Carlberg and Rick Roberts will contact each of you with the proper deadline date and where to send them.

WEC PROGRAM

Our first year with the new WEC program has been completed for all purposes. There were many good results and comments from patrols and patrollers regarding the refreshers and the 20 WEC courses that were taught. We now have about 120 instructors trained which should be enough to teach our refreshers next fall and not cause any one instructor to have to teach for more than three hours. There will be an instructor's clinic in each region in late summer or early fall to go over the material to be taught and manner in which we wish to have it presented. Next year the plans are to have stations set up and each patroller will have a check off card that must be signed by an instructor and turned in at the completion of the day before they can take the final test. The test will be reviewed at the close of the day for questions. For any patrol presently running a WEC course or considering a course for next year, I would suggest their doing so prior to the ski season as it seems to be difficult to do so during the season. WEC courses can only be requested by a patrol leader and should be submitted to the division WEC supervisor.

The new WEC textbook will be in the summer catalogue and available for shipment around September. The cost will be between \$15 and \$20. This has been a transitional year and many rough edges were apparent but these will smooth out as instructors become more familiar with the material and patrollers more comfortable with the WEC program. I would appreciate any comments and suggestions for next year.

WINTER EMERGENCY CARE UPDATE

The Winter Emergency Care Program Advisory Committee met with the divisional winter emergency care supervisors in Denver, January 29 through 31. During that meeting progress and problems were reviewed within the Winter Emergency Care Course instituted in 1987. In addition ongoing implementation of this program was discussed with special attention to program administration, obtaining grants for financial support, text development, and instructor certification. The meeting was very productive and in general the comments from the divisional WEC supervisors was very positive.

As with any new project, administrative problems were anticipated in 1987, and changes have been made with hopes that administration will be much simpler in the 1988-89 season. The text is well underway and is going to represent a state of the art very professional work and barring problems with the printers should be available after September 1, 1988. Watch Ski Patrol Magazine for notices of preprinting offers appearing in the summer issue.

The instructor's manual is going to be a very comprehensive document printed at the national level and sold in a three ring binder so that it may be updated easily. The instructor's manual should be available after April 2, 1988. There are ongoing plans to complete a student workbook which will follow course objectives of the Winter Emergency Care Course being available in fall of 1988.

The refresher study guide will again appear in the summer issue of Ski Patrol Magazine and will have information, objectives, reading assignments, etc., for the fall refreshers in 1988. During this meeting the refresher outline and content have been reviewed and generally planned into the early 1990's.

In the WEC program, 1987 was the year of the patroller. During that year an attempt was made to introduce to the Patroller the Winter Emergency Care Course and to bridge him into this new performance oriented first aid program.

1988 will be the year of the Instructor. During 1988, instructor training will be completed and instructors attending phase one of emergency care instructor update during 1987 will be offered the chance to complete phase two and become full-fledged course instructors. In addition, a program has been outlined for ongoing instructor education and recertification and recertification of instructorship.

The Winter Emergency Care Course is proceeding very well and has had by and large overwhelming positive response from patrollers. The Advisory Committee has developed an action plan once again for the 1988-89 season and has submitted this to the National Board for consideration.

THE JIMMIE HEUGA USA EXPRESS

The Express chugged into Beech Mountain on February 14 and many patrollers were there to participate. We are happy to report that \$16,000 was earned for this non-profit scientific research organization "Reanimating the Physically Challenged". Alpine Cable Vision and the Weather Channel handed out awards to each of the participating patrols and to the police chiefs from the towns they represented.

The Jimmie Heuga USA Express is a national fund raising marathon ski series that challenges you to test your limits and a mountain! Co-ed teams of three will compete to raise the most money from businesses and individuals and be part of a group that attempts to ski more than one million vertical feet in a day.

The USA Express, entering its fourth year, is hosted by more than twenty ski resorts and benefits the Jimmie Heuga Center, a non-profit organization "reanimating the physically challenged."SM The winning team from each area will receive a trip to Vail, Colorado, April 14-17. There, USA Express winners will compete and participate in the festivities at the 1988 USA Express finals.

At the finals in Vail winners will also have the chance to ski with 30 former Olympic and World Cup skiers, as the Olympians attempt to accumulate a million vertical feet in a single day. Past skiers include Billy Kidd, Phil Mahre, Jean-Claude Killy, Cindy Nelson and other national, Olympic and international celebrities.

During 1987 Sun Valley reigns as the Ski Resort National Champion, with High Sierra Energy Systems from Mammoth Mt. capturing the Team National Championship.

Jimmie Heuga, a bronze medalist in the 1964 Olympic slalom, is accustomed to such challenges. After he was diagnosed in 1970 with multiple sclerosis (MS), he developed a very successful personal fitness program rather than follow the traditional treatment of non-exertion.

"Our goal should be to challenge ourselves based on what we are able to do," says Heuga.

In 1984 he founded the Jimmie Heuga Center, now recognized by medical organizations and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society as an alternative means of health care. The Center, the only one of its kind, seeks to improve the quality of life for persons challenged by chronic conditions through participation in a goal-oriented program of fitness and self motivation.
